**On Monday, February 20, 2017, at about 2253 hours I was working uniformed patrol in the City of Riverside. I was in the roll call room at the Lincoln Station when I heard Officer Carmona radio broadcast that he and his partner were involved in a shooting in the area of 4041 MacArthur. The suspect was last seen running down the driveway to [REDACTED] in a northeast direction. I immediately responded to the scene. I positioned my unit at the corner of MacArthur and Hawthorne. The officers were in the process of conducting a felony stop on a vehicle occupied by two subjects with one subject outside the vehicle on the ground. I positioned myself across the street from where the Officers last saw the suspect run east down the driveway of [REDACTED]. I covered this area with Officer Roberts until the felony stop was concluded. I then assembled a search/ K-9 team to check the immediate area where the suspect was last seen. When we walked up the driveway to [REDACTED] could see a puddle of blood, cellphone, black baseball hat and a blood trail leading to the backyard. The gate that led to the back yard was open and their was blood on the cement.**

The search team cleared the front and backyards to [REDACTED]. We then cleared the front and rear yard to [REDACTED]. While in the backyard of [REDACTED] I could see what appeared to be blue shorts with blood stains on the other side of the chain link fence in the backyard of [REDACTED].

I heard Officer E. Garcia radio broadcast that he found a trail of bloody footprints on MacArthur further north that led to Sage Avenue. Sergeant Ortiz responded to that location to contact Officer E. Garcia. This information led us to believe that the suspect had made it out of the immediate search area, but still inside the perimeter. At this point I stopped the search and went to the command post to relay the information about the search and the evidence items located.

Based on the circumstances, Lieutenant Hoxmeier initiated a full SWAT callout. When Sergeant Corbett arrived I briefed him on the incident and what we had done up to that point. I walked back to my unit and changed into my SWAT gear. I went back to the command post where a tactical plan was formulated to search the area where the bloody footprints stopped. I assembled a react team to respond to any emergencies while the main search team checked the residences where the bloody footprints led. I positioned my team at the corner of MacArthur and Saffron Court.

I heard Sergeant Corbett radio broadcast that his search team was to the front of [REDACTED] Court and evacuations were in progress for the surrounding residences. While several people were exiting the [REDACTED] residence a subject matching the suspect description exited the house and refused to cooperate with the officers commands. Air-one radio broadcasted that the subject then ran back into the [REDACTED] residence. I moved my team to the dead-end of Saffron to contain the rear of [REDACTED]. Sniper Officers Simpson and Lim were positioned on the roof of [REDACTED]. Officers Paes, Moulton and K-9 Officer Feimer were positioned in the backyard of [REDACTED]. Officers Hammer and Pap were positioned in the backyard of [REDACTED].

Once the rear containment and rear sniper positions were in place I responded to the rear of the ARV (Armored Rescue Vehicle) and met with Sergeant Corbett. At this point, both residences on the sides and rear of [REDACTED] were evacuated. Sergeant Corbett updated me on the situation. He advised me that a security light on the front of the house was extremely bright and was lighting up the team creating an officer safety issue and a significant tactical advantage for the suspect. Several 40mm sponge rounds had already been used to try and disable the light without success. Lieutenant Blomdahl approved the use of 12 gauge shotgun Federal #00 buckshot to disable the light. I retrieved the shotgun from my patrol unit. The security light had two LED style lights pointed in different directions. I positioned myself on the right rear

corner of the ARV. I fired one round and it disabled the security light pointed at the 1/2 corner of the residence. I fired a second round and it disabled the security light pointed at the 1/4 corner of the residence.

I met with Sergeant Flores who supervises the emergency negotiations team at MacArthur and Sage. I briefed him on this incident and we formulated a plan to use the throw phone to try and establish communication with the suspect to convince him to surrender peacefully. I briefly met with one of the residents who lives at [REDACTED]. He wanted to warn me about a crawl space used for storage next to the upstairs bedroom that his father uses. He said this would be a possible hiding spot for the suspect. He was able to draw an upstairs floorplan for me.

When the throw phone was ready a team and I moved up to the front of the residence and deployed the phone into the upstairs bedroom window. The phone was activated and continually rang loudly. It was never picked up by the suspect.

A chemical agent tactical plan was formulated and approved by Lieutenant Blomdahl. I was assigned to throw a canister (Defense Technology Flameless Tri-chamber) of CS gas into the upstairs bedroom window on the front of the residence. This was an attempt to force the suspect out of the bedroom or crawl space and down the stairs to the first floor and ultimately out the front door to surrender to officers peacefully. This was the same window that the throw phone was deployed into. My team and I walked up to the bedroom window and got within about 6 feet of the house. I threw the canister into the window. About thirty seconds later I could see the CS gas float out of the window. The gas plan was completed. Shortly after the last burn safe was deployed I heard Officer Hammer radio broadcast that the curtains were on fire near the deployment of the burnsafe on the 3/4 corner of the residence. Sergeant Corbett immediately requested RFD stage at MacArthur and Sage and to ready a METRO Pack which is a collection of hoses to connect to the main line and fight the fire from the ARV. Shortly after the fire started, several officers to the rear of the residence radio broadcasted that they heard a gunshot come from inside the residence. Sniper Officer Simpson broadcasted that the suspect threw a trashcan out of the bathroom window on the backside of the residence.

Officer Monreal was able to retrieve and connect the fire hoses. Sergeant Corbett used one hose to the front of the residence to spray water on the house and keep the fire from spreading to the surrounding residences. I provided cover for him until it was my turn to man the hose. I sprayed water on the front of the house and roof area where the fire was smoking. Another line was used on the front of the house and then two more to the rear of the house. Four hose lines were used from different directions to try and put out the fire and keep it from spreading.

Sergeant Corbett and I met with RFD personnel. A plan was developed to have RFD personnel put on ballistic helmets and vests and replace SWAT personnel manning the water hoses. SWAT officers would now provide lethal cover while RFD tried to control the fire. I positioned myself to the rear of the residence where I could supervise the two RFD/SWAT water hose teams.

After several hours the fire was extinguished. SWAT and RFD personnel walked around the residence to evaluate the safety issues. The suspect was located deceased in the bathroom to the rear of the residence. The scene was turned over to the Robbery/Homicide detectives and RFD investigators. At this point all personnel not needed were cleared from the scene.
