62. Narrative of Supplemental Report 62a. Audio Recording Available? <u>No</u> On 02/20/17 at approximately 2253 hours, partner Officer Serrato and I were working uniformed patrol in a marked police car in the City and County of Riverside. We were at the Orange Street Police Station when we heard an unknown unit broadcast "shots fired." An unknown Sergeant then asked for the unit's location, but there was no response. Shortly afterwards, dispatch broadcasted the unit's GPS showed at La Sierra and Bushnell. C Serrato and I drove towards the 91 Freeway to make our way to the "shots fired" broadcast. Moments later, I heard what I believed were the voices of Officers Carmona and Espinoza (unit 3R40) broadcast they had shots fired at 4041 MacArthur Road. The officers stated they had several subjects at gun point, but one Hispanic male suspect, armed with a handgun fled the location. Officer Serrato and I arrived on scene and assisted Officers Carmona and Espinoza with conducting a felony stop. We helped detain two males and one female without incident.

Officer Serrato and I were then tasked to assist Sergeant McCoy and other Officers with a safety sweep of the surrounding properties. The search team first went to [REDACTED] and located a pool of blood, a blood trail, a cellular phone, a hat and a T-Shirt in the driveway. We then went to [REDACTED] to see if the blood trail continued to that property. We did not locate additional evidence at [REDACTED] but we looked over its back fence and saw a pair of blue shorts in an adjacent backyard [REDACTED]. The shorts appeared to have blood on them. Approximately two minutes later, I heard an unknown patrol unit broadcast that he located bloody footprints east of our location.

A full METRO call out was initiated so Officer Serrato and I broke from the search team and reported to the tactical command post. Sergeant Corbett was at the tactical command post and stated there were bloody footprints in the area of [REDACTED] so he assigned Officer Serrato and I to a perimeter position east of that location. We were initially set up directly east of [REDACTED] but were repositioned to the backyard of [REDACTED] to act as a containment unit.

At approximately 0630 hours, partner Officer Serrato and I were contacted by Officers Soria and Allison. They told us we were tasked with being members of a four stage chemical agent mission and our code name was George 4. Our mission was to integrate Officers Crocker and Waters into our team, deploy from [REDACTED] and introduce a "burn safe" containing the chemical agents into a large addition along the east side of [REDACTED]. The addition extended approximately five feet further west than the home's original footprint. That extension allowed the addition to have windows along its south, east and north walls. Officer Serrato and I conducted an assessment of the addition and determined the safest location to deploy the burn safe would be into a window at the north side of the addition. At approximately 0702 hours, the gas missions were initiated. Our gas mission (George 4) was completed at approximately 0707 hours.

I saw smoke and flames rise from the addition of [REDACTED] within three seconds of deploying the burn safe into the house. The flames appeared to originate from the floor near the window that we deployed the burn safe. We (George 4) moved approximately 20 feet away (northeast) from the house and broadcasted that our gas mission was successful, but a small fire had broke out along the eastside of the house. Sergeant Corbett requested fire respond to assist with the structure fire. We (George 4) moved into the backyard of [REDACTED] and maintained containment along the eastside of [REDACTED]. While we were moving back to our containment position (approximately one minute after deploying the burn safe) I heard one pop, followed by a short pause then at least three additional pops. I was wearing noise reducing headsets at the time of this incident so I was unable to determine if the pops were gun shots or sounds of compressed canisters "cooking off." As fire personnel responded, I broadcasted that we needed at least one fire hose in the backyard of [REDACTED] because it was closest to the eastside of [REDACTED].

The personnel from Engines 5 and 2 responded to my location with one fire hose. The fire fighters were initially reluctant to enter the backyard so patrol officers took the hose and attempted to extinguish the flames while Officer Serrato and I provided scene security. We continued our attempts at fighting the fire until we were relieved by fire personnel. Officer Serrato and I stayed on scene to provide security to the fire fighters until we were released from our post by Sergeants Corbett and McCoy. No further information.
